

Intended Use

The *therascreen* BRCA1/2 NGS FFPE gDNA Kit (next-generation sequencing) panel is a molecular diagnostic assay intended to be used for the identification of variants in the coding regions of the *BRCA1* and *BRCA2* human genes, in DNA derived from formalin-fixed paraffin-embedded (FFPE) ovarian tumor tissue. The *therascreen* BRCA1/2 NGS FFPE gDNA Kit panel is intended to be used as an aid for the classification of ovarian cancers.

Warning

The *therascreen* BRCA1/2 NGS FFPE gDNA Kit has been validated in combination with the Illumina MiSeqDx platform and with the Biomedical Genomics Workbench software (including a specific analysis workflow).

The entire workflow should be subject to independent verification by the end-user laboratory before being introduced into routine use.

Summary and Explanation

Over 200,000 women are diagnosed worldwide with primary ovarian cancer (OvCa) each year. OvCa has the highest mortality rate of all female gynecological cancers (1, 2). The vast majority of positive diagnoses are of women with advanced stage OvCa and the average five-year overall survival is about 45%.

Approximately 15% of OvCa is attributable to germline mutations in BRCA1/2 and a smaller percentage can be accounted for by other germline mutations. In contrast, a large fraction of OvCa cases can be attributed to a growing number of somatic aberrations (occurring only in the tumor mass itself) in critical tumor suppressor genes, including BRCA1/2 (3, 4).

OvCa is a heterogeneous group of distinct diseases. About 90% of all OvCas are epithelial carcinomas and belong to five major histotypes: Mucinous, Endometrioid, Clear Cell, Low-Grade Serous and High-Grade Serous Carcinoma (HGSC). HGSC is the most prevalent, and most deaths (70%) are of patients presenting with advanced-stage (FIGO stage III or IV) HGSC. Although HGSC has distinguishing clinical characteristics from the other subtypes, patients with this histotype still show diverse outcomes even after the same or very similar treatment regimens (5). Further patient segmentation is based on molecular alterations (6).

It is currently estimated that BRCA1/2 germline mutations occur in around 10–20% of OvCas, and this proportion may be as high as 25% in patients with HGSC (7, 8). BRAC1/2-mutated patients show a higher overall survival than BRAC1/2 wild-type patients (9). In addition, and importantly, patients with BRCA1/2 somatic alterations show similar prognosis as their BRCA1/2 germline-mutant counterparts. Somatic mutations rates have been estimated at around 7% in unselected OvCa patients (4).

Standard OvCa therapy consists of cytoreductive surgery followed by platinum-based chemotherapy. Compared to other solid cancers, HGSCs are unusually sensitive to platinum-based chemotherapy and are frequently amenable to retreatment. Although most patients respond to initial treatment, drug resistance emerges, and most patients relapse with a median progression-free survival of only 18 months (10, 11).

Poly (ADP-ribose) polymerase (PARP) inhibition was first introduced in 2005 as a novel cancer-targeting strategy following preclinical work which showed activity in *BRCA*-mutated tumor cells. *BRCA1* and *BRCA2* dysfunction, which results in a lack of homologous recombination, markedly sensitizes cells to PARP inhibition by synthetic lethality. Patients with germline *BRCA1/2*-mutated OvCa have been shown to derive a clinical benefit from treatment with PARP inhibition (12–14). Recent clinical data further indicate efficacy of PARP inhibition in patients with somatic *BRCA* mutations but without germline mutations, thereby greatly expanding the number of patients who could benefit from this treatment (3, 15).

In view of the great significance of BRCA1/2 mutations for prognosis and treatment, the Association of Gynecologic Oncology (AGO) Austria has recently recommended that women with OvCa be tested for germline BRCA1/2 mutation and that quality-controlled testing of the tumor material should also be performed (16).

As the majority of clinical OvCa specimens are FFPE tissue, subsequent analysis of DNA extracted from such FFPE tumor samples is qualitatively challenging. Also, unlike the clinically-relevant mutation spectrum of other genes analyzed on FFPE tumor DNA (e.g., KRAS or EGFR), where the distribution and number of mutations is small, thousands of clinically-relevant variations in BRCA1/2 have been described. These are distributed widely throughout multiple, large coding regions and intron-exon boundaries (17). In addition, tumor samples are histologically heterogeneous (18) and tumor-specific DNA will contain varying proportions of contaminating DNA from normal cells.

Sanger DNA sequencing methods may not be sensitive enough to detect low-level somatic changes and are difficult to scale for high throughput applications. In this context, NGS offers a solution to this challenging type of analysis for a comprehensive mutation screening of *BRCA1* and *BRCA2* genes. This technology is explicitly supported by AGO to test for those commonly mutated genes in an effort to better stratify the patients (16).

Principle of the Procedure

The *therascreen* BRCA1/2 NGS FFPE gDNA Kit is a PCR amplicon-based assay using 4 multiplexed primer mixes designed to amplify all coding regions of the *BRCA1* and *BRCA2* genes, including the 20 intronic nucleotides adjacent to each exon. The recommended amount of DNA for each multiplex PCR reaction is 10 ng of purified genomic DNA, for a total of 40 ng.

After the PCR reaction is complete, the 4 reactions of each sample are pooled and purified. Next, the resulting PCR amplicons are bar coded and amplified using a library preparation method compatible with Illumina MiSeq instrument. Then, using a quantitative PCR-based solution, initial library quantitation is performed before proceeding to library normalization and pooling. Next, a second library quantitation is performed for an accurate normalization of the pooled library. The pooled library is now ready for denaturation and sequencing in Illumina MiSeqDx platform. Sequencing demultiplexed raw data (FASTQ files) are then imported to the Genomics Cancer Research Workbench software for deeper analysis to identify variant positions compared with the reference sequence of the *BRCA1* and *BRCA2* genes.




Figure 1. Multiplex PCR-based targeted enrichment scheme. The *therascreen* BRCA1/2 NGS FFPE gDNA Kit uses multiplex PCR-based targeted enrichment technology. The adjacent primer sets are distributed across an appropriate number of pools to minimize nonspecific amplification products.

In the first step, the full coding regions of *BRCA1* and *BRCA2* genes (including at least 20 adjacent intronic nucleotides) are amplified in 4 separate multiplex PCR reactions per sample using HotStarTaq[®] DNA polymerase in a standard thermal cycler (Figure 1). At the end of the reaction, PCR products are pooled per sample before proceeding to bead purification.




Figure 2. Library preparation and scheme for ligation of adapters. An end-repair step is performed to repair damaged DNA to produce 5' phosphorylated, blunt-ended DNA. The A-addition reaction produces double stranded amplicons with a 3' "A" overhang compatible for ligation to 3' dT overhangs on Illumina adapters.

In a second step, each purified PCR product reaction is individually bar coded by adding Illumina-compatible adapters in both amplicon extremities (Figure 2).

After reactions are complete, a two-step library size selection reaction is performed: first to remove un-ligated PCR fragments and second to remove large fragments using a bead-based protocol.




Figure 3. Library amplification scheme. Universal P5 and P7 primers are used to amplify tagged fragments that have adapters on both ends.

The next step increases PCR library quantity. A simplex PCR amplification is performed to specifically amplify the bar coded fragments (Figure 3).

Next, each purified amplified library is quantified by qPCR and pooled in equimolar amounts. The pooled library is then quantified a second time before proceeding to sequencing.

Sequencing is performed following the Illumina manufacturer's protocol. FASTQ files are processed with Biomedical Genomics Cancer Research Workbench software with the BRCA1/2 CE-IVD Workflow. A variant call format file is generated for each sample and Biomedical Genomics Cancer Workbench software is recommended for variant interpretation.




Figure 4. In-process control criteria. Through the sequencing workflow (blue boxes), several in-process control steps are performed (yellow lozenges) to validate the T-PCR, the library preparation and the sequencing run. The final criterion used to ensure good quality variant calling at a given position is the minimum coverage obtained. Specificity relates to the percentage of pair reads aligned to the target region.

To ensure good quality of the results, in-process control criteria are used at different steps of the library preparation and sequencing run (Figure 4). These criteria allow validation of the different steps of the workflow to identify samples that give poor sequencing results or to indicate potential contamination.

* Pooled in 4 tubes of primer pairs are 253 pairs of primers designed to cover the target region. Amplicons are designed with an average of 153 bp; minimum 105 bp and maximum 200 bp.

If any component of the *therascreen* BRCA1/2 NGS FFPE gDNA Kit is not frozen on arrival, the outer packaging has been opened during transit, or the shipment does not contain a packing note or the reagents, please contact QIAGEN Technical Services or local distributors (visit **www.qiagen.com**).

Storage conditions

The *therascreen* BRCA1/2 NGS FFPE gDNA Kit should be stored immediately upon receipt at -15° C to -30° C in a constant-temperature freezer. Caution must be observed to protect qPCR mixes from light.

Stability

When stored under the specified storage conditions, the *therascreen* BRCA1/2 NGS FFPE gDNA Kit is stable until the stated expiration date.

Once opened, reagents can be stored in their original packaging at -15° C to -30° C until the stated expiration date shown on the packaging. Do not exceed a maximum of 5 freeze-thaw cycles.

For stability information relative to the reagents and kits not provided, please refer to the respective handbooks.

Specimen Handling and Storage

Sample material must be human genomic DNA extracted from FFPE tissue.

Specimens must be transported according to standard pathology methodology to ensure specimen quality.

Store all FFPE blocks and slides at room temperature 15–25°C based on CLSI standard MM13-A (19). Transport conditions of FFPE blocks are similar to storage conditions.

Slides may be stored at ambient temperature for up to 1 month prior to DNA extraction.

FFPE-derived DNA should be either freshly prepared or stored between 4°C and 8°C for short-term storage, or between -15° C and -30° C for long-term storage


Procedure: Part 1


Workflow overview

Parts of the workflow described in the scheme below have been optimized for this procedure, including steps requiring kits and reagents that are not provided.



Please read the following procedure carefully and refer only to Part 1 and Part 2 of this handbook for instructions.





Genomic DNA extraction

Use a kit to purify genomic DNA from samples prepared from FFPE ovarian cancer specimens.

Genomic DNA quantitation

For accurate DNA quantitation resulting in optimal DNA concentration, we recommend using a fluorometer and an assay kit that allows DNA quantitation across a range of initial sample concentrations from 100 pg/ μ l to 1000 ng/ μ l.

The DNA concentration of a sample must be ≥ 2.5 ng/µl to ensure sample quantity for downstream experiments.

If the quantity of DNA is insufficient, extract more tumor tissue, if available (see "Troubleshooting Guide", page 40).

Protocol: Target PCR setup

The *therascreen* BRCA1/2 NGS FFPE gDNA Kit allows testing of 20 samples in total in two sequencing runs. We recommend performing each sequencing run with 10 samples plus one NA12878 positive control and one nuclease-free water for no template control (NTC). Distribute samples in a 96-well PCR plate according to the plate layout shown in Figure 6.

Figure 6. Layout scheme of the 96-well target PCR plate.

Procedure

- 1. Thaw reagents on ice.
- Dilute DNA (including the positive control NA12878) to 2.5 ng/µl with nuclease-free water in a LoBind tube. For each sample, 10 ng (4 µl, 2.5 ng/µl) per PCR reaction is required, for a total of 40 ng.

- 3. We recommend testing 10 samples plus one NA12878 positive control and one NTC control per sequencing run. Prepare PCR strips or a 96-well PCR plate according to the number of reactions. Label with sample names and pool numbers.
- Prepare the 4 T-PCR premixes on ice according to Table 2 below. For each sample, 4 T-PCR premixes will be needed. Mix gently by pipetting up and down.

- 5. Dispense 16 μl of T-PCR premix into wells of a 96-well plate according to the plate layout described in Figure 6.
- Add 4 µl of each DNA sample into the reaction mix of each PCR according to the plate layout shown in Figure 6. Mix gently by pipetting up and down.

7. Seal the wells before loading into a thermal cycler and program the cycling conditions as indicated in Table 3.

 After the reaction is complete, proceed with "Step: Sample pooling and purification", page 27.

Note: If the samples are to be stored prior to purification, transfer them to a -15° C to -30° C freezer.

Note: The launch of the T-PCR run can be delayed up to 6 hours before starting the PCR reaction if reactions mixes are stored at $2-8^{\circ}$ C.

Step: Sample pooling and purification

The 4 T-PCR reactions from the target PCR step are pooled for a unique pool of PCR products per sample. The pool of PCR products is purified, preferably using magnetic bead-based technology, before proceeding to library preparation.

Transfer approximately 25 µl of each sample supernatant to a clean 1.5 ml LoBind tube and determine the DNA concentration of samples, preferably with a fluorometer.

Note: If samples are to be stored prior to library construction, transfer them to a -15° C to -30° C freezer.

Before proceeding to library construction, check DNA samples against the quality control criteria as explained below.

Quality control criteria

Measure the concentrations of the purified pooled PCR-enriched DNA samples, the positive control and the no template control (NTC) using a fluorometer.

- NA12878 positive control concentration must be >20ng/µl to show that no error has occurred during the T-PCR and purification steps.
- NTC must be "not detected". Detectable DNA indicates potential contamination of the PCR and/or purification.
- DNA concentration of PCR-enriched DNA samples 1–10 must be >4ng/µl to ensure sample quality for downstream experiments.

If there is evidence of contamination, or the concentration of sample DNA or positive control is insufficient, see "Troubleshooting Guide", page 40.

Step: Library construction

Perform the library construction using reagents and adapters compatible with Illumina MiSeq instruments.

Step: Cleanup of adapter-ligated DNA

Cleanup of adapter-ligated DNA using silica gel columns technology removes DNA fragments <150 bp following library construction.

Step: Fine size selection

After library construction, this step allows the removal of large size fragments with magnetic bead-based technology.

Transfer approximately 17 µl of each supernatant to a clean 1.5 ml LoBind tube.

Note: The median size of the library DNA should be 280 bp.

Step: PCR amplification of purified library

High fidelity amplification ensures that there is sufficient quantity of library DNA for the downstream sequencing step.

Step: Library cleanup

Primers, nucleotides, polymerases and salts are removed from the amplified libraries using silica gel column technology.

Note: A library can be stored in a -15° C to -30° C freezer prior to quantitation.

Step: Library quantitation

Accurate quantitation of amplifiable library molecules is essential for optimal reads quality and efficient data generation. The use of a qPCR library quantitation kit compatible with Illumina libraries is required for this step.

Quality control criteria

- The concentration for the positive control NA12878 must be >120 nM to show that there were no errors causing loss of DNA during the library construction, amplification and purification procedures.
- The concentration for the NTC must be <1.0 nM to show that there was no contamination during the library construction, amplification and purification procedures.
- The concentration of a sample library must be >80 nM to ensure sample quality for downstream experiments.

If the there is evidence of contamination, or the concentration of sample DNA or positive control is insufficient, see "Troubleshooting Guide", page 40.

Step: Library pooling

The *therascreen* BRCA1/2 NGS FFPE gDNA Kit allows testing of 20 tumor samples in two sequencing runs. We recommend performing a sequencing run with 10 samples plus one NA12878 positive control and a no template control (NTC). Libraries of 10 samples and controls are diluted to 4nM and pooled, and then the pool is quantitated. The calculated concentration is used to obtain a final library pool concentration of 14 pM after denaturation.

Library dilution to 4 nM and pooling

Note: Take extreme care when pooling libraries.

Prepare dilutions of 10 library samples, and the NA12878 positive control, to a final concentration of 4 nM in nuclease-free water according to the initial library concentrations calculated in the previous step. Diluted libraries of 10 samples, NA12878 positive control and the negative control are pooled together.

Library pool quantitation

The use of a qPCR library quantitation kit compatible with Illumina libraries is required for this step.

Before proceeding to "Protocol: Preparation of pooled library for sequencing" page 32, check the quantitation of the pool against the quality control criteria as explained below.

Quality control criteria

- The concentration for the NTC must be <1 pM to show that there was no contamination during the pooling procedure.
- The concentration of the pooled library must be approximately 4 nM to ensure pool quality for sequencing.

If the concentration of the pooled library is insufficient, see "Troubleshooting Guide", page 40.

Protocol: Preparation of pooled library for sequencing

Two procedures are performed in this protocol:

- Denaturation and dilution of the pooled library
- Preparation of PhiX internal control and addition to the pooled library

Note: Detailed descriptions of library denaturation and setting up an Illumina MiSeq run are available in the Illumina *MiSeq System Denature and Dilute Libraries Guide* and *MiSeq System User Guide*.

Reagents required for this protocol

- NaOH 10N
- MiSeq Reagent Kit v2 1/2 and 2/2
- PhiX Control v3
- 10 mM Tris-Cl, pH 8.5 with 0.1% Tween 20 to dilute PhiX

Important points before starting

- Always prepare freshly diluted NaOH for denaturing libraries. This step is essential to the denaturation process.
- To prevent small pipetting errors from affecting the final NaOH concentration, prepare at least 1 ml of freshly diluted NaOH.
- For best results, begin thawing the reagent cartridge before denaturing and diluting libraries. For instructions, see the *MiSeq System User Guide*.

Things to do before starting

• Prepare freshly diluted NaOH 0.2N.

Combine the following volumes in a microcentrifuge tube:

- Laboratory-grade water (800 µl)
- Stock 1.0 N NaOH (200 µl)

The result is 1 ml of 0.2 N NaOH.

Remove the tube of HT1 (Hybridization Buffer; provided with the kit) from storage at -15°to -30°C and set aside at room temperature to thaw. When thawed, store at 2°to 8°C until you are ready to dilute denatured libraries.

Denaturation and dilution of the pooled library

Procedure

1. Carefully denature the library pool by adding 5 μl of NaOH 0.2N to 5 μl of the library pool, vortex briefly, pulse spin and then incubate for 5 minutes at room temperature.

Note: Always use freshly prepared diluted NaOH.

- 2. Stop the denaturation reaction by adding 990 μl of prechilled HT1 to the tube containing the denatured DNA.
- 3. Dilute the denatured DNA to 14 pM using prechilled HT1 in a final volume of 600 µl, taking into account the initial library pool concentration.

For example, if the concentration of the pooled library was calculated at 20 pM after denaturation, adjust the concentration to 14 pM by pipetting 180 μ l of pre-chilled HT1 into 420 μ l of denatured DNA. Invert the tube several times to mix.

4. Place the denatured and diluted DNA on ice until you are ready to load the library.

Preparation of PhiX internal control and addition to the pooled library

Procedure

1. Dilute the PhiX internal control library to 4 nM by combining the volumes of components shown in Table 4.

Table 4. PhiX dilution to 4nM

Component	Volume
10 nM PhiX internal control library	2 µl
10 mM Tris-Cl, pH 8.5 with 0.1% Tween 20	3 µl

2. Denature the 4 nM PhiX internal control library by combining the volumes of components shown in Table 5.

Table 5. PhiX denaturation

Component	Volume
4 nM PhiX internal control library	5 µl
NaOH 0.2N	5 µl

- 3. Pulse spin the tube and incubate for 4.5 minutes at room temperature.
- 4. Stop the denaturation reaction by adding 990 μl of pre-chilled HT1.
- 5. Dilute the 20 pM denatured PhiX internal control library to 12.5 pM by mixing 375 μ l of denatured PhiX 20 pM with 225 μ l of prechilled HT1. Invert the tube several times to mix.
- 6. Add 6 µl of 12.5 pM PhiX to the 600 µl diluted library. Vortex and centrifuge for 1 minute at 1000 x g, and then place on ice.

Proceed to "Protocol: Setting up and starting the sequencing run", page 35.

Protocol: Setting up and starting the sequencing run

Two procedures are performed in this protocol:

- Loading the pooled library into the MiSeq reagent cartridge
- Starting the sequencing run

Loading the pooled library into the cartridge

Note: A detailed description of setting up an Illumina MiSeq run is available in the Illumina *MiSeq System User Guide*.

Reagents required for this protocol

• MiSeq Reagent Kit v2 1/2 and 2/2

Things to do before starting

- Remove the reagent cartridge (provided with the kit) from -15° to -30°C storage. Place the reagent cartridge in a water bath containing enough room temperature deionized water to submerge the base of the reagent cartridge up to the waterline printed on the reagent cartridge. Do not allow the water to exceed the maximum waterline.
- Allow the reagent cartridge to thaw in the room temperature water bath for approximately one hour or until completely thawed.

Procedure

- Remove the cartridge from the water bath and gently tap it on the bench to dislodge water from the base of the cartridge. Dry the base of the cartridge. Make sure that no water has splashed on the top of the reagent cartridge.
- Invert the reagent cartridge ten times to mix the thawed reagents and then visually
 inspect that all positions are thawed. Inspect the reagent in position 1 to make sure that it
 is fully mixed and free of precipitates.

- Gently tap the cartridge on the bench to reduce air bubbles in the reagents. Place the reagent cartridge on ice or set aside at 2–8°C until you are ready to set up your run. For best results, proceed directly to step 4.
- 4. Visually check the integrity of the foil seal and then use a clean 1 ml pipette tip to pierce the foil seal over the reservoir on the reagent cartridge labeled "Load Samples".
- Pipette 600 µl of the denatured, diluted library pool with PhiX control into the "Load Samples" reservoir (sample position #17 on the cartridge).

Starting the sequencing run

Note: A detailed description of setting up an Illumina MiSeq run is available in the Illumina *MiSeq System User Guide*.

Note: A detailed description of creating and editing sample sheets for Illumina instruments and analysis software is available in the *Illumina Experiment Manager User Guide*.

Things to do before starting

- Clean the Illumina Flow Cell (provided in the MiSeq Reagent Kit v2 1/2) according to the manufacturer's instructions. The flow cell is a single-use device.
- Illumina recommends creating the sample sheet prior to sample preparation.

Procedure

- 1. Restart MiSeq with **Research** mode and then select **Sequence** mode.
- 2. When the Load Flow Cell screen appears, load the flow cell.
- When the Load Reagents screen appears, empty the waste bottle. Remove the bottle of MiSeq SBS Solution (PR2) from storage at 2–8°C. Invert to mix, remove the lid and load the PR2 bottle immediately.
- 4. Select the appropriate sample sheet according to the adapter bar code set selected during the adapter ligation step.

- 5. Using Illumina Experiment Manager, select Create Sample Sheet. In the Select Category window, choose Other and FASTQ Only.
- 6. In the FASTQ Only Run Setting window, select TruSeqLT, choose 1 Index Read, select Paired End Sequencing, and 151 for Cycles Read1 and Cycles Read2, and then select Use Adapter Trimming and Use Adapter Trimming Read 2.
- 7. Choose adapters according to those selected for the library preparation (see Table 6, below).

Note: We recommend using Illumina Experiment Manager to create a new sample sheet for every sequencing experiment. Do not open or modify the sample sheet before use.

8. Select Finish and save the sample sheet file in the desired MiSeq folder.

- 9. After loading the flow cell and reagents, review the run parameters and perform a pre-run check before starting the run.
- 10. Review **Experiment Name**, **Analysis Workflow** and **Read Length**. These parameters are specified in the sample sheet.
- 11.Review the folder locations in the lower-left corner.

If any changes are needed, select **Change Folders**. When the changes are complete, select **Save**, and then select **Next**.

12.Select Next. The Pre-Run Check screen opens.

In the lower-left corner of the **Review** screen, the current folder locations for recipes, sample sheets, manifests and output folders are listed.

13. The system performs a check of all run components, disk space and network connections before starting the run.

If any items do not pass the pre-run check, a message appears on the screen with instructions on how to correct the error.

- 14. When all items successfully pass the pre-run check, select Start Run.
- 15. When the run is complete, the **Next** button appears. Review the results on the **Sequencing** screen before proceeding.

Note: The **Sequencing** screen remains viewable until **Next** is selected. After you select **Next**, it is not possible to return to the **Sequencing** screen.

16.Select Next to exit the Sequencing screen and proceed to a post-run wash.

The post-run wash is the standard instrument wash performed between sequencing runs. Always perform an instrument wash after completing a run. Follow the software prompts to load the wash components and perform the wash. The post-run wash takes approximately 20 minutes. Start the wash directly following the completion of a run. An instrument wash is required before you can set up a subsequent run. Before proceeding to "Protocol: Data analysis", page 12 in Part 2, check the output of the sequencing run against the quality control criteria as explained below.

Quality control criteria

- Data output >3 Gb indicates sufficient quantity of reads.
- The percentage of reads with a Q-Score >Q30 must be >80%. A Q-score is a prediction of the probability of a wrong base call.

If the output of the sequencing run is insufficient, see "Troubleshooting Guide", page 40.
